INEZ, a Cum Laude, Berklee College of Music alumna, is a musical polymath for singing, music production, arranging, songwriting, drumming, and audio mixing, mastering and engineering. INEZ was named "Pittsburgh Music Artist of the Year" for 2020 by WYEP 91.3FM, and selected as a SCALE Fellow. INEZ was Highmark First Night 2023 headlining performer. Wilkinsburg Community Development Corporation was organized and incorporated as a non-profit in 2008. The Board of Directors had a plan to make a difference in Wilkinsburg. A mission statement was developed and it stated "to promote the revitalization of Wilkinsburg through business & residential development; organizational & individual civic leadership; and ethnic & cultural diversity".

Since opening their first office in 2010, much has been accomplished. Most people are well aware that the old Wilkinsburg Train Station, 901 Hay Street, 15221, has been beautifully restored due to the efforts of the WCDC. The Station is a large, iconic building with a tremendous presence in the business district. Other buildings have been restored, but lives have also been restored through WCDC's initiatives. Here's a rundown of some of the amazing progress that has happened in Wilkinsburg due to the diligent efforts of the WCDC. 74 business district properties have new owners, 31 property owners have renovated their building façades, 25 vacant storefronts have been filled, 370 residents have received small business training and 70 new businesses have opened in Wilkinsburg

The CORE FOUR Business Planning Workshops have resulted in 134 accomplished graduates, with 93% have been BIPOC and nearly 70% have been Black women.

Working with housing partners, 100 units of affordable housing have been created, 12 new housing units have been constructed, 53 blighted properties have been cleared in Wilkinsburg. Additionally, 52 vacant properties have new owners, and 29 homeowners received critical home repairs.

The WCDC has generated over 265 positive press articles about Wilkinsburg and hosted thousands of residents and visitors at street festivals, Vacant house tours, home and Garden tours, and other community events. The WCDC has helped over 2850 youth achieve their educational and civic goals by providing grants and marketing assistance to support local summer and after-school programs.


Historic Western PA School for the Deaf (WPSD) to present Community Block Party on Saturday, September 23, 2023 from 1:00 PM to 4:00 PM





Western PA School for the Deaf is situated at the border of Wilkinsburg and Edgewood, on land that was once owned by James Kelly. When the school was first organized in 1868 it was Kelly who deeded ten acres of land for the purpose of supporting the creation of a permanent school dedicated to the education of deaf children. The land had been valued at \$60,000 in 1870. The actual construction was thwarted by legal concerns with the Pennsylvania Railroad. The original gift parcel was then sold to the Railroad with the proceeds used to purchase the present site for the school. The school was built in 1883 and could accommodate nearly 300 students. In December 1899 a fire broke out in the boy's wing and the school burned down. Plans for a new school were implemented and philanthropic citizens and organizations raised the money to build the school again. The cornerstone was laid in May 14, 1903. This antique postcard image shows the school as it looked in 1911. Many upgrades and additional buildings are now part of the campus, and over the years the size of the campus has doubled with the acquisition of ten additional acres.



WPSD has a tradition of giving back to the community and the annual Community Block Party is a great example. Saturday, September 23, 2023 will be the 18th annual Block Party, where WPSD hosts an afternoon of fun for everyone. With music, petting zoo, games, food, and fun activities, a good time is guaranteed for all who come. Local businesses and non-profits also participate to promote what they do and distribute information. The Community Block Party is held on the campus of WPSD at 300 E. Swissvale Avenue, Pittsburgh, PA 15218. The informational tables, games and displays are also along Swissvale Avenue, Walnut Street and next to the Trinity Lutheran Church for the Deaf. This event is FREE and open to the public!







These are the three books that the **Wilkinsburg Historical Society** wrote and published during the past twelve years. They help to promote and preserve the history of Wilkinsburg and raise funds for the various projects of the Society. All three books are still available to purchase from the Society. Another way to support the activities of the Historical Society.

On the far left is "Images of America - Wilkinsburg", a 128 page soft-bound book printed by the Arcadia Publishing Company. It includes over 220 black and white photos depicting the history of our town from the early land patents in the late 1700s up to the 75th celebration of Wilkinsburg in 1962. The book is available from the Wilkinsburg Historical Society for \$20.00, plus \$3.00 for shipping.

The middle book above is "Wilkinsburg High School - Century of Learning 1911-2011". This book chronicles the history of the local high school from its early start in the late 1880s, the creation of the magnificent structure in 1910, and each decade since with highlights of the events that were important in the lives of the students and the Wilkinsburg community. For over 100 years the Wilkinsburg High School served the Borough of Wilkinsburg students and this book has several hundred photos showing much of this important history. This Century of Learning book is available from the Wilkinsburg Historical Society for \$15.00, plus \$3.00 for shipping.

The book on the far right is "Wilkinsburg - 1887-2012, Celebrating the Past, Present and Future". This book was produced by the Historical Society in 2012 to recognize the 125th anniversary of Wilkinsburg's incorporation as a Borough. This soft-bound book has 196 pages and includes chapters on the history of Wilkinsburg, the celebrations from the past, information about Wilkinsburg's government, and all the events that occurred during the 125th celebration. There are several chapters about the clubs and organizations in Wilkinsburg as well as the churches and worship centers in the Borough. The "future of Wilkinsburg" section recognizes advertisers and sponsors who helped to fund the creation and printing of the book. This book, originally \$15.00, is now available for \$10.00, plus \$3.00 for shipping.
